A NEW FUTURE FOR AG EDUCATION IN SC

JOHN DE LA HOWE SCHOOL FOR AGRICULTURE TO OPEN NEXT YEAR

A South Carolina property is returning to its roots as the John de la Howe School for Agriculture prepares to welcome a class of 80 agriculture students in August of 2020.

Located in McCormick, South Carolina, John de la Howe is one of the oldest learning facilities in the state, having opened its doors in 1797, just nine years after South Carolina's incorporation as a state. The school operated as a working farm for state orphans from its inception until the 1990s,

in their chosen field, utilizing the 1,310 acres of forests and farmland, greenhouse operation and working farm composed of Polled Herefords, Yorkshire hogs, goats, and horses, available on John de la Howe's campus. Students will even be able to participate in the production and sale of agricultural goods.

"Our mission is for the school to be a 'little brother' to Clemson University and South Carolina State University," Keown added.

when it transitioned into an alternative school for troubled youth. After a state-conducted feasibility study on the effectiveness of agriculture-focused schools in South Carolina and a change in administration, John de la Howe was given the green light to begin rebranding as a pre-university experience for 10th and 11th graders interested in pursuing agriculture.



John de la Howe School for Agriculture is the first statewide program of its kind in the nation. Under the direction of Interim President Sharon Wall, the school has undergone dramatic changes, from renovating campus buildings and dorms to

implementing new technology. The end goal is to one day host over 300 students, including out-of-state students, and be added to the prestigious list of governor's schools in the state.

The school will accept both residential and day students who will have the opportunity to immerse themselves in all school activities, farm responsibilities, and events. Residential students will live in on-campus housing while day students will attend school during the week and return to their homes at the end of each school day. Eligibility requirements and applications can be found online at delahowe.sc.gov. Applications are open to current rising high school sophomores and juniors in South Carolina and are due by February 13, 2020.

"We want students from all 46 counties to be represented, all the way from Jasper to Greenville," Keown says.

"Our goal is to have the best high school experience available in South Carolina for ag-minded students," said Tim Keown, director of the Education Center at John de la Howe.

While all general education courses will be ag-focused, there will also be three main agriculture education pathways for students to take: Plant and Animal Sciences, Environmental and Natural Resources with a heavy emphasis on forestry management, and Horticulture. Students will receive hands-on training

THANKFUL

As Commissioner of Agriculture, I spend a lot of time urging people to be thankful for farmers. It's part of my job to help the public understand the work that goes into feeding, fueling, and clothing the world.

But as Thanksgiving approaches, I've been thinking about how farming isn't just about the farmers themselves. There's a whole network of support out there that makes it possible for farmers to do what they do:

I'm thankful for farmers' families. A farm isn't just about the people planting, tending, and harvesting the crops. It's about the grandparents picking up their grandkids from school while the parents are busy on the farm. It's about the teenager who gives up his weekends to drive a tractor, the mom working a desk job while her husband farms, the cousin who no longer farms but speaks up for the interests of farmers in his workplace and community. Neither my mother or my wife Blanche ever milked a cow, other than on a rare occasion, but they might as well have. The challenges of dairy farming required "all hands on deck" and always seemed to be the topic of discussion at every meal.

I'm thankful for our veterans – some of whom are farmers. Around 19 percent of South Carolina farms have a principal producer who's served

in the military. SCDA is vitally interested in supporting our farmer veterans.

I'm thankful for our leaders. It can be easy to criticize the people in charge. But when disasters have struck South Carolina farmers – hurricanes, floods, drought – our local, state, and national leaders stepped up to the plate to help farmers hang on. At last count over 1,000 farmers in South Carolina have applied for assistance from the federal disaster funds approved last summer.

I'm thankful for communities. From banks to churches to FFA and Farm Bureau, there are a lot of people out there working hard to support farmers. That's especially important in the stressful times that farmers face, economic and otherwise.

I'm thankful for people who eat local. When you buy Certified South Carolina products, visit a farmers market, or eat at a Fresh on the Menu restaurant, you're supporting farmers and keeping money in your community. It makes a difference when you make that extra effort.

I've said it before in this column, but the Thanksgiving holiday is one of my favorites. The relaxing time with family and good food puts me in a thankful mindset. Happy Thanksgiving from my family to yours!

STATE FARMERS MARKETS GET READY FOR THE HOLIDAYS

Looking for a Christmas tree — or just some all-around seasonal cheer? Check out these SC Department of Agriculture events in different parts of the state.

The Pee Dee State Farmers Market kicks off the season on the Saturday after Thanksgiving with its **Christmas Warm Up**. The event will offer a large selection of Christmas trees, plus activities for kids including games and prizes and the opportunity to take a photo with Santa. Hot chocolate, cookies and roasted marshmallows round out the occasion.

The Christmas Warm Up runs from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday, Nov. 30 at 2513 West Lucas St. in Florence.

In the Midlands, the annual **Country Christmas Celebration** will be held the Sunday after Thanksgiving at the South Carolina State Farmers Market. There will be plenty of Christmas trees for sale, and Santa will be passing out candy canes and listening to Christmas wishes. The event runs from 1 to 5 p.m. on Sunday, Dec. 1, at 3483 Charleston Highway in West Columbia.

A SOUTH CAROLINA CHRISTMAS TREE FARM GEARS UP FOR THE SEASON

Dale Cullum rattles off all the varieties of tree he grows at Turkey Creek Christmas Tree Farm.

“Leyland cypress, Murray cypress, white pine, Virginia pine, Carolina Sapphire, red cedar, Blue Ice,” he says, looking around his Edgefield County property. There are between 1,500 and 2,000 trees of harvestable size here, he says. The trees’ colors range from sparkling blues to crisp greens, and they’re all thriving in the cool, sunny, early November weather.

What you won’t see here are any Fraser firs. Though ubiquitous in retail Christmas tree sales, Fraser firs don’t grow well below about 3,000 feet of elevation, ruling them out for South Carolina growers.

Some South Carolina tree farmers, including Cullum, buy imported cut Fraser firs to supplement their own crop. It’s just the nature of the business, he says: People want what they’re accustomed to, and he doesn’t want to lose out on sales.

Cullum is an award-winning tree farmer: Turkey Creek trees have won Best In Show at the South Carolina State Fair five out of the last eight years, including 2019 — his 30th year in business.

“I started doing this in 1989 because I had open land and wanted to do something besides livestock,”

Cullum explains, adding that he’s only the third or fourth owner of this land since the 1700s. “It’s a hobby, but it’s grown into a lot more than that as far as upkeep — trimming, mowing, getting the farm in good shape.”

Early on, he would cut trees and sell them on a tree lot away from the farm. In later years, he opened up the farm for agritourism, offering holiday activities along with the opportunity for customers to pick and cut their own tree.

After 30 years in the business, he’s starting to see people who visited the farm as children come back with their own children. The farm has a little train they tow behind a tractor, giving kid rides during the holiday season.

“We have 2-, 3-year-olds whose parents say, ‘I remember when I rode in that train,’” he says.

Cut one inch off the tree trunk.

Display in stand with at least one gallon of water.

(Fresh trees will drink a gallon or two per day!)

Check water daily.

Do not place tree near a heat source.

SOME COMMON SC CHRISTMAS TREE VARIETIES

BLUE ICE

A variety of Arizona Cypress. Foliage is blue green in color, soft to the touch, and very dense with an outstanding aroma. Due to their tendency to dry out even in water stands, it is recommended to cut these three to four weeks before Christmas.

CAROLINA SAPPHIRE

A relatively new cultivar of Arizona Cypress. Beautiful blue color and wonderfully aromatic. Longevity is similar to cedar but is soft to the touch!

CLEMSON GREENSPIRE

A variety of Arizona cypress developed in cooperation with Clemson University for Christmas trees and rooted in greenhouse operations. Tree has a conical shape and light green foliage. An excellent Christmas tree.

DEODAR CEDAR

Branching and needles similar to firs. Great for decorating, sturdy but prickly. Unique musky aroma. Lasts well, but like firs, some inner needle shedding can occur. Native to the Himalayas.

EASTERN RED CEDAR

Most of us in the South had one growing up. Great smell but somewhat prickly. Not as long-lasting as pines. Best cut two to three weeks before Christmas. A Southern Classic!

LEYLAND CYPRESS

Incredibly long-lasting when kept in water. Doesn't shed! Fast becoming the new Southern tradition in Christmas trees.

MURRAY CYPRESS

A variety of the Leyland Cypress. This tree drops very few needles and with proper care, will easily stay fresh through the entire Christmas season. In addition to being a beautiful tree with soft foliage and a lemon mint aroma, it does not produce pollen.

VIRGINIA PINE

The most popular Christmas pine on South Carolina tree farms. Sturdy limbs, long-lasting, great pine scent. Native to upper piedmont and mountain areas.

WHITE PINE

South Carolina is one of the few Southern states growing this Christmas pine, which grows naturally all the way into Canada. Soft blue-green foliage, long-lasting with a great pine scent. Takes the longest to grow.

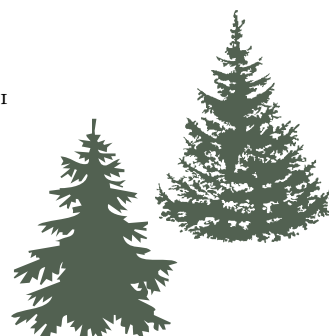

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THE WEATHERS FAMILY THANKSGIVING TABLE

Blanche Weathers, wife of Commissioner of Agriculture Hugh Weathers, shared some recipes she's planning to make this Thanksgiving. In addition to the dishes printed here, she's also planning to make Arkansas Green Beans and Duck Dynasty Mashed Potato Casserole, two recipes she originally found on Pinterest that have become family favorites.

MOMIE'S CREAMED ONIONS

This is not exactly Momie's recipe, but this one is close, and it is good. I am absolutely certain Momie's recipe did not include the wine.

INGREDIENTS

- 14 ounces frozen petite whole onions or 2 jars (not pickled)
- 2 Tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 1/3 cup dry white wine
- 1/4 teaspoon minced fresh thyme
- 1/3 cup cream or half and half
- 1/4 teaspoon dry mustard
- 1 pinch freshly grated nutmeg
- 1 pinch white pepper
- Salt to taste
- 1/2 cup graded sharp cheese
- 1/2 teaspoon snipped fresh chives to garnish

DIRECTIONS

In a large sauté pan melt butter and stir in flour to make a roux. Pour in cream and whisk to remove any lumps. Add wine and spices and simmer until thick. Add cheese to melt and toss in the onions. Place in a 9x13 casserole and top with more cheese. Bake for 30 minutes at 350 degrees until bubbly hot.

CAROLINE MARCUS' MAMA'S BEEF TENDERLOIN

When I reached out to my friend Caroline to ask whether Market Bulletin could print this recipe, we had a great conversation about how we fellowship over food. We hope printing these recipes will help others remember special relationships and make new ones.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 large beef tenderloin, trimmed
- White vinegar
- 1 Tablespoon each: salt, pepper, garlic powder
- 3 Tablespoons Worcestershire sauce
- 1 1/2 teaspoons yellow mustard
- 1 stick butter
- 1 1/2 teaspoons hot sauce

DIRECTIONS

Let tenderloin come to room temperature. Pat with white vinegar and top with paste made of salt, pepper, garlic powder, Worcestershire sauce and yellow mustard. Cover top of tenderloin. Place in shallow baking pan and place under broiler in oven for 10 minutes. Do not turn it over. Turn oven down to 250 degrees and pour butter mixed with hot sauce over top of tenderloin. Bake at 250 degrees as follows:

4-5 pounds	6-8 pounds
35 minutes	40-45 minutes

Take out of oven and allow meat to rest for 20 minutes before carving.

BREAD & BUTTER PUDDING

This is a variation on a dish that was a favorite of Princess Diana.

INGREDIENTS

- 12 sliced white bread
- 5 ounces whole milk
- 4 ounces unsalted butter, softened
- 15 ounces heavy cream
- 9 egg yolks
- 4 teaspoons amaretto
- 6 ounces fine sugar
- 3 ounces slivered almonds
- 1 vanilla bean
- 1 ounce powdered sugar

DIRECTIONS

In a small sauce pan, combine milk and cream and vanilla bean split lengthwise. Simmer to flavor milk. Remove bean and scrap seeds into milk mixture. Pour over beaten yolks and stir constantly adding amaretto. Trim crust from bread and cut each slice corner to corner to make triangles. Butter each piece generously and arrange in casserole in two layers. Pour milk mixture/custard over top making sure all bread is completely moistened. You may need to mash the bread down a little in the custard. Allow this to set for at least an hour. Top with slivered almonds. Place casserole in a pan with about 1/2 inch of water. Bake in preheated oven 30 minutes until browning slightly. Serve with whipped cream and fresh berries.

AMBER'S CARROTS

These go great with the beef tenderloin. I usually double this recipe.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 2 Tablespoons diced onions
- 2 Tablespoons prepared horseradish
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1 small bag fresh carrots
- Pepperidge Farms Stuffing Mix
- 1-2 Tablespoons butter

DIRECTIONS

Place carrots in a greased casserole. Mix mayonnaise, onion, horseradish and salt together and pour over carrots, stir to cover carrots. Toss together butter and stuffing mix and sprinkle over top of carrots. Bake at 375 for 30 minutes. You can also top with cheese.

CONGEALED STRAWBERRY SALAD

My cousin Angie gave me this recipe. Double it if you want to use a 9x13 dish like I do!

INGREDIENTS

- 1 small box strawberry Jell-O
- 1 #2 (20 oz.) can crushed pineapple (drain and save liquid)
- 1 pound of frozen strawberries, thawed
- 2 crushed bananas
- 1 8-ounce container sour cream

DIRECTIONS

Heat pineapple juice and enough water to equal 2 cups. Add Jell-O and dissolve. Add strawberries, pineapple and bananas. Put half the mixture in an 8x8 casserole dish and chill to firm. Spread sour cream over top and pour remaining Jell-O on top of that. Chill for several hours.

BREAKFAST CASSEROLE

I got this recipe from a good friend of mine.

INGREDIENTS

- 1 box seasoned croutons
- 1 pound Carolina Pride hot sausage, browned and drained
- 2 cups grated sharp cheese
- 1 can cream of mushroom soup
- 4 eggs, beaten
- 2 1/2 cups milk
- 3/4 teaspoons dry mustard
- 1 small can sliced mushrooms

DIRECTIONS

Place croutons in buttered 9x13 casserole. Top with cooked sausage, mushrooms, and grated cheese. Mix together beaten eggs with all other ingredients and pour over top. Let sit in refrigerator overnight. Bake 300 degrees for 40 minutes or until it is set in the middle. You can vary this recipe by adding salsa and pepper jack cheese for a Mexican flavor.



CLEMSON STUDENT STUDIES EXTRA-LONG STAPLE COTTON FOR PRODUCTION IN SOUTH CAROLINA

FLORENCE – All cotton is not created equal, and a Clemson University student is looking to bring back a species that once dominated South Carolina cotton fields.

Sarah Holladay, a master’s student from Florence who is studying plant and environmental sciences with a focus in agronomy, is working with Clemson Extension Service cotton specialist Mike Jones and USDA-Agricultural Research Service cotton geneticist Todd Campbell at the Clemson Pee Dee Research and Education Center to determine if pima cotton can be productive in South Carolina after an almost 100-year absence. Holladay believes pima could benefit the state’s cotton farmers.

“Pima is worth more than double the price of upland cotton due to its superior fiber quality,” Holladay said. “Pima fibers are longer, stronger, finer and more uniform than upland cotton, making pima cotton easier to process and spin into thread. The textile industry and export markets are constantly requiring higher quality cotton with pima-like fiber properties.”

Pima cotton flourished in the Lowcountry of South Carolina before boll weevils wiped it out in the 1920s and the state’s cotton farmers turned to growing upland cotton. Most pima cotton today is grown in Arizona, California, New Mexico and Texas.

Holladay is studying lint yield, gin turnout, fiber length and fiber strength. Fiber length affects yarn strength, yarn evenness and spinning process efficiency. Pima fibers measure between 1.25 to almost 2 inches long, while upland cotton fibers range from about 0.875 to 1.312 inches long. Fibers shorter than 0.5 inches long are not considered suitable for spinning and have no commercial value for the textile industry.

Information from Cotton, Inc., shows fiber length is largely influenced by variety, but cotton plants’

exposure to extreme temperatures, water stress, or nutrient deficiencies may also result in shorter fibers.

“In our study, the Bleak Hall pima accession was found to have the longest fibers,” Holladay said. “It was grown in South Carolina prior to the 1930s. It had an average fiber length of 1.65 inches when ginned on the roller gin, and 1.49 inches when ginned on the saw gin.”

Bleak Hall is an accession that originated in Charleston. An accession is a group of related plant materials from a single species collected at the same time from a specific location. Gins are used to separate cotton fibers from their seeds. Saw gins normally are used to gin short-staple cotton and roller gins are used to gin long-staple cotton. Most South Carolina gins are saw gins. Holladay said determining if the same gins can be used to process long-staple cotton is one objective of the study.

“Of the 50 varieties in the study, just six responded to the ginning method,” she said. “Five varieties performed better on the roller gin and one performed better on the saw gin. More data is needed to determine which gin performs the best.”

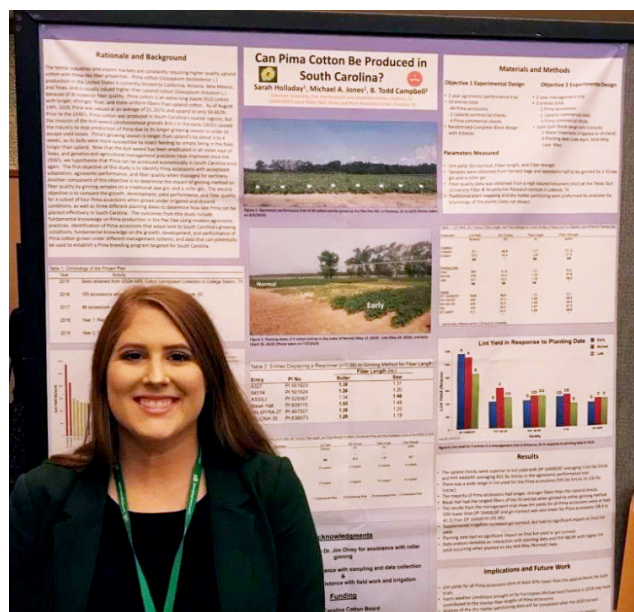
In addition to using the same gins, Holladay said farmers also can use the same machinery to cultivate and harvest pima cotton as they do for upland cotton. Although some pima varieties mature later and often require an additional 3-4 weeks to ensure maximum yield potential, the growing seasons for pima and upland cotton are similar. Planting for both generally occurs around late April. Harvest is done around October.

Until she has some definite answers on pima cotton, Holladay said South Carolina farmers probably will see more advantages by growing upland cotton.

“Upland has had more genetic improvements than pima and generally yields more than pima in South Carolina,” she said.

Depending on quality, transportation and market demand, South Carolina farmers might profit from growing pima cotton, Nathan Smith, Clemson Cooperative Extension Service agribusiness economist, said.

“The 10-year and 5-year average price for American pima cotton was \$1.42 per pound and \$1.37 per pound respectively,” said Smith who is located at the Clemson Sandhill Research and Education Center. “The 10-year average price for U.S. upland cotton was 72 cents and 66 cents per pound for the last five years. The difference over the last 10 and five years has averaged 70.9 cents and 71 cents per pound. Basically, there has been a 71-cent difference between the U.S. pima and U.S. upland cotton price with pima receiving the higher price. The net revenue would depend on the costs and yield to grow pima cotton in South Carolina versus upland cotton.”
